






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
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Foreword


THOMAS BITTERMAN


MICHAEL BLASSBERGER


HOWARD DACHS


ARI EDELSTEIN


MOSHE FASKOWITZ


HERSHEY S. FRIEDMAN


MORRIS FUCHS


AMROM GESTETNER


WILLIAM GEWIRTZ


ROBERT GOLDSCHMIDT


HARRY HUSARSKY


NACHMAN KAHANA


ZVI E. KATZ


ISRAEL E. LAMM


JACK LAZAROS


LAWRENCE LIEBER


IRVING MOSKOVITS


ARYEH S. OBERSTEIN


SAMUEL OBSTFELD




The tournaments, played during the spring and fall seasons, attract a great number of spectators who, in their enthusiasm, are always right in the







Under their tutelage the latent qualities of Mesifta students were brought into focus with gratifying results.



Yes . . . well, that is definitely mathematics.




Like a mighty colossus he doth bestride our world.

been quickly and firmly entrenched in the hearts of his students. He will be long remembered as having made a successful transition from the comparative safety of the library to the hazardous field of teaching.


Mr. Newmark conducts his classes with the poise of a man many years his senior and seems destined for a prolonged stay in the school's confines.


Rabbi Krieger has never disappointed them.




Rabbi Fessel


It is said that a teacher's success may be measured by the average class marks, and in Mr. Abrams' case this proves to be an extremely effective criterion.




You have seen the pictures of the graduates, and in the process of searching for a familiar face, you might have been struck by many strange faces that nevertheless compelled you to look again.



And the waterfalls crash forever downward, A growing crescendo to a dying song.


The leaves of the weeping willow grow up to droop down, And innocent golden wheat grows up towards the knife . . .

The tidal wave of destiny comes higher now, Ready to pay us for our hidden crimes. . . .



Just one of the many subject to the endless persecutions, the insuperable restrictions, the heinous purges, the pernicious attacks, the insurmountable fear of a government where atheism is king and intolerance the guiding principle. And as day follows day, the number of Alexis become fewer, the waiting becomes more passionate, the yearning more implacable.



המהר"ל מפראג בדרשתו לשבת הגדול, עמד על נקודה נפלאה, מאחר שה' מבל את קרבו הבל: "וישע ה' אל הבל ואל מנחתו איד זה יתכו שנגרם לו שהרגו קין ע"י זה. למה לא שמרתו המצוה של הקרבת הקרבו. הלא ידוע כי "שומר מצוה לא ידע דבר רע". וכתב אעפ"י שהקרבו הי' קרבו נעים ביותר, אבל עדייו חסר הי׳ דבר אחד גדול מאוד. התורה מעידה על קרבן הבל שלא בא מכח התעוררות עצמו אלא: "והבל הביא גם הוא", אחר שראה שקין הביא, התעורר הבל להביא גם הוא. אמנם שלם הי' קרבנו של הבל בכל דקדוקי שלמות קרבו, אבל עדיין חסר הי׳ החלק העיקרי, המעמדו של הבל, ומוסר לנו המהר"ל יסוד, שבכל מצוה שאדם עושה בתורת "הביא גם הוא". לא נמצא בה הכח של שומר מצוה לא ידע דבר רע. "שומר מצוה" לא נקרא אלא אדם שהמצוה נעשתה למצוה של עצמו. לאבר מאבריו לחלק מנפשו. אבל אם נשאר אצל האדם בעשיתו רק זה שקיבל מחברו שממנו נתעורר, לא זהו עדיין התכללות האמיתי, שכל זמן שהמצוה לא נכנסה לדמו ולנפשו עדיין אינו "שומר מצוה", ועדיין אינו בכלל שומר מצוה לא ידע דבר רע. חיות האדם בנוי בעיקר על עצמו, על עצמותו. והגה"ד ר' ירוחם ליוואוויץ מסביר: "אם אין אני לי מי לי". אם איז להאדם ה, אני לי" - "מי לי", האדם מוכרח להעשות עולם בפני עצמו, לשפר וליפות את העצמיות שלו. את האני שלו עד שיבא לקצה השלמות

וחשבתי להבין בזה את דברי ר' חנינא שבראש דברי, פשוט וברור שכל עיקר חינו הוא לקבל התורה מרבותינו שליט"א. עלינו לשתות בצמא את דבריהם. אבל דוקא מפני זה עלינו למצא עזר ע"י חברינו. הרב דומה לנו למלאך ה' צב־אות. דברי הרב אין לנו למרהר אחריהם. אנו מקבלים את דברי הרב בלי שום בקורת, אמיתיים הם דברי הרב בלי כל ספק. ועל כן עומדים אנו בסכנה לקבל את התורה. כמו שאנו שומעים אותה מהרב בלי שום תוספות של מעצמינו. עומדים אנו בסכנה להית בתוכה, בדרגת "הבל הביא גם הוא". וזה לא טוב לא לנו ולא לתורתנו, כי החיוב עלינו שתעשה התורה לתורת עצמינו "ובתורתו" יהגה יומם ולילה שכל עוד שלא נקלטה התורה בדמינו ובנפשינו עדיין לא נכנסנו ללמוד, ולכן עלינו לקנות חברים. שהדברים שאנו לומדים מחברינו בטבע אנו מתנגדים להם לדברים. ולמדים אנו לבקר ולהתעורר מעצמינו, ועי"ז משתלם לנו החסרון שחסר לנו ע"י קבלת התורה מהרב שהוא קבלה בלי שום בקורת מעצמינו. ועל ידי החברים והתלמידים אנו הולכים ונגמרים. וכל מה שקבלנו מרבותינו נגמר אצלינו ע"י דיכוק חברים.

"על עזבם את תורתי"

מדי שנה ושנה בבא אותו היום המר — נשב על הארץ וירדו עינינו דמעה ונתאבל "איכה ישבה בדד" ונזכור כל התלונות והצרות שהיו גורלנו מעת הגלתינו אבינו מעל שלחנו, ונקרא אליו, ונתחנן לפניו, ונבקש ממנו: "אנא בנה ביתך כבתחלה".

והדבר פלא הוא! שהרי מאמר חכמינו זכרונם לברכה צווח ואמר: "כל דור שלא נבנה (בית המקדש) בימיו, מעלים עליו כאלו החריבו" (ירושלמי יומא) וא"כ גם אנו שמתאבלים על חרבנו ומתפללים יום יום על בנינו, באמת מחריבים את בית אלקינו! והראי שהרי עוד לא נבנה. ואלו חדלו כל המניעות מצדנו. בוודאי לא הי אבינו הרחמן מאריך הגלות. ולא עוד אלא בתשעה באב ממש בשעת כל מעשה האבילות והבקשות – ג"כ מחריבים אנו את ביתנו. דאם לא כן הי' בנוי בו ביום ממש! היתכן הדבר!

ובאמת הפסוק מגלה בפרוש את עונם — "על עזבם את תורתי..., והגמרא מפרש אותו ה"עזיבת תורה" — "שלא ברכו בתורה תחילה" כלומר שלא ברכו ברכת התורה קודם לימודם. וזהו מ"עזיבת תורה" שגרם כל החרבן והגלות! הרי זה צריך ביאור הרבה, שכיון שהסבירו את ה"עזיבת תורה" במה שלא ברכו בתורה כראוי, אם כן מוכח שלמדו תורה בשקידה רבה יומם ולילה והיו בקיאים בכל פנות התורה. והיו אנשים צדיקים ושלמים שלא פסקו פומייהו מגרסא, דאם לא כן היו בוודאי תולים החטא כמה שחסרו בלמוד התורה. שהרי זה פשטות הענין. וא"כ איך הביא אותו העון, שלכאורה קל הערך, החרבן האיום והגלות! ואיד נחשבה זה "עזיבת תורה", הלא עסקו בתורה כל היום!

ועוד לפי מה שהסביר רבנו יונה בטעמא דמילתא דלא ברכו בתורה תחילה, אדרבה. הי' גם זה חומרא ומדת חסידות. שמבואר דאין מברכים רק על עצם מעשה המצוה ולא על הכשר או הכנה למצוה. ואותו הדור טעו וחשבו שכל תועלת הלמוד הוא רק להביאם לידי מעשה של שאר המצוות והי' רק בגדר הכשר מצוה. אבל לא ראו בלמוד התורה גוף המצוה. ולכן חששו לעון ברכה לבטלה החמור מאד ולא ברכו בתורה תחילה. וא"כ מבואר דלא "הי' זה אפילו זילזול ברכות אלא חומרא מחשש ברכה לבטלה ח"ו, ואיך נקרא אותם "עוזבי תורה"?

ובאמת, היא הנותנת! שהרי במה שלא חשבו תלמוד תורה לעצם המצוה, פגעו בחשיבות התורה. ופגיעה אפילו דקה וכל שהוא בחשיבות התורה אינה באמת אלא "עזיבת תורה",והגם שכלפי חוץ היו מתמידים וגדולים בתורה, בפנים היו "עוזבי תורה". שאם אין לתורה חשיבות היאות לה. סוף סוף גם כלפי חוץ יעזבו תורה לגמרי.

וראינו זה בימינו, בתחלה לא רצו ה"משכילים" אלא להוסיף על שלימות התורה גם צורך שלימות בשאר חכמות ולעלות בעיני העמים — להיות יהודי מבפנים וככל הגוים מבחוץ — אבל תוצואת שיטה כזו נודע לכל והחריבה העולם. וזהו מה שהחריבה בית המקדש, אותו הגרעון והפגיעה בחשיבות התורה,

אין זה סתם "בטול תורה" או כדומה. אלא "עזיבת תורה" ממש. ולאחר זמן יוברר הדבר למפרע שכן נמצא וכן הי'. ובאותו עוון אנו מחריבים את הבית גם עכשיו.

התורה היא הקנין לכל השלמות והמעלות בעולם. הגאון ר' ברוך בער זצ"ל הסביר את הדבר בראי' ברורה ופשוטה. דאלו הי' שום ענין של שלימות בדבר זולתו — בוודאי הי' השי"ת מוסר אותו לבניו במעמד הר סיני וכיון שראינו שלא נתן לנו, מוכח מזה שרק התורה היא "כל חיינו" וכל השלימות האפשר. ואילו נעיז ונלך לבקש שאר חכמות ושלימות אחרת. כבר כפרנו ח"ו בחשיבות התורה, ומילא "עזבנו תורה" לגמרי — עזיבה ממש ח"ו! ואעפ"י שאין אנו בטלים ממנה ועוסקים בה רוב היום — כבר עזבנו אותה. ובאותו שעה שאנו בוכים ומתאבלים על חרבן בית המקדש — באותו רגע שורפים אנו אותו בידים ממש!

גדלות בתורה ויראת שמים

מאז ומתמיד, בהמשך הדורות. התאמצו האבות בקרב עם ישראל. להוריש בלב בניהם אחריהם, את רגשי האהבה והמסירות לתורה וליראת שמים. בשני היסודות האלה ראו את התנאים העיקריים לקיומנו בתור עם ה': "כי הם חיינו ואורך ימינו". לאור התורה ערכו וסידרו את אורח החיים היום־יומיים, ומתוך יראת שמים ניגשו לנהל את עניניהם בבית ובחוץ.

החרדים לדבר ה' קיימו את המצוות בדחילו ורחימו, וכשם שביקשו להתקדש ולהטהר בקדושת התורה בחייהם הפרטיים, ברשות היחיד שלהם, כך רצו, מתוך הכךה מלאה, לקדש את שם ה' ברשות הרבים, כדי לשמש לאות ולמופת לאחרים. ובדאגתם העמוקה לעתיד, הכינו את בניהם, הבנים הצעירים, שילכו בעקבותיהם, וביחד, נערים וזקנים, בלב אחד ישאו את דגל התורה והמסורה.

המטרה הראשונה היתה לעשות את התורה מקור תמידי ללימוד, "מה אהבתי תורתיך. כל היום שחתי" (תהלים קי"ט). כתוצאה מנאמנות זו לתורה, התורה מתחבבת על בעליה "דברי תורה חביבין על לומדיהן כל שעה ושעה כשעה ויאשונה" (עירובין נ"ד:). בלי התמדה בלומד בלי קשר בלתי פוסק עם העיון בתורה, כלי ידיעות דקדוקיה, ופרטיה, אי־אפשר להגיע לגדלות בתורה. זה כלל גדול ידוע: "הפוך בה והפוך בה דכולה בה, ובה תחזי וסיב ובלה בה, ומינה לא תזוע, שאין לך מדה טובה הימנה" (אבות "ה"). לקבוע עתים לתורה, פירושו ללון בעומקה של תורה, ולחדור אל חדרי חדריה, ואז כמובן מגלים את יפיה ותפארתה, וזה מה שביקש דוד המלד ע"ה: "גל עיני ואביטה נפלאות מתורתד" (תהלים קי"ט).

ה"חפץ חיים" וצ״ל פירש את המשנה (אבות ב׳) "אם למדת תורה הרבה, אל תחזיק טובה לעצמך כי לכך נוצרת". הוא אומר: "כי זו היא מטרת הבריאה כולה, מבלעדי התורה הננו כעניים ודלים לעולמי עד. ומבלעדי כסף, הננו עניים רק לשעה קלה לחיי העוה"ז. והיה אם נשאל את האיש החכם, במה יבחר, אם להיות עני לשעה קלה ועשיר לעולמי עד, או להפך עשיר לשעה קלה ועני לעולם ועד? יענה בחכמתו כי יותר טוב לו, לסבול צער ולחץ למשך שעה קלה, ובלבד שיתענג תענוגי נצחי, לזמן שאין לו קצבה". (החפץ חיים על מס׳ אבות). חז״ל הדגישו ואמרו: "ברכת התורה מנין, אמר ר׳ ישמעאל ק״ו, על חיי שעה מברך, על חיי עולם הבא לא כל שכן" (ברכות מ״ח:).

ומלימוד תורה מגיעים ליראת שמים. זוהי דרך טבעית מאד. התורה מדליקה בתוכינו את אש המסירות לקיים דבריה הקדושים. "ימינו אש דת למו" (דברים ל"ג), אומרים חז"ל מגיד הכתוב שדברי תורה נמשלו כאש, מה אש נתנה מן השמים, כך דברי תורה נתנו מן השמים שנאמר: (שמות כ') "אתם ראיתם כן מן השמים דברתי עמכם" (ספרי וזאת הברכה ל"ב), התורה שנתנה מן השמים קוראת לנו לקבל עלינו עול המצוות ולקיימן בשלמות מתוך יראת שמים.

ברור שלמדרגה של שלמות ביראת שמים אפשר להגיע רק אם הוגים וחושבים תמיד בדברי תורה, ויורדים לעומק רעינותיה. כה יפים ואמיתיים הם דברי רבנו יונה זצ"ל ב"שערי תשובה" (שער שני י"ג) "בשעת אשר יהגה האדם בתורת ה' ויקרא בדברי הנביאים והכתובים, ויבין בנועם המוסרים ויראה האזהרות והעונשים, יחרד לדברים ויכין לבו להטיב דרכיו ומעלליו זיתרצה אל השם, כענין שנאמר בישעי' "ואל זה אביט אל עני ונכה רוח וחרד על דברי" וכו'.

לימוד התורה בישיבות מסוגל לעורר בלב התלמידים אהבת תורה ויראת שמים, אווירת התורה השוררת בין כתלי הישיבות מביאה לידי חיזוק והתחזקות גם ביראת שמים. שניהם דבוקים זה בזה. במוסדות התורה, שבהם אור התורה

מאיר את דרך החיים של החניכים הצעירים, אפשר להבטיח את התקשרות נפש העם עם התורה, נכון העירו חז"ל: "הנפש והתורה נמשלו לנר. הנפש שנאמר: (משלי כ', כז) "נר ה' נשמת אדם". והתורה שנאמר: (שם ו', כג) "כ' נר מצוה ותורה אור", אמר הקב"ה לאדם נרי בידך ונרך בידי וכו', אם אתה משמר את נרי, אני משמר את נרד"... (דברים רבה ד').

נשתדל גם אנחנו בדורנו להגדיל תורה ולהאדירה, ולחזק יראת שמים בכל פינה שבחיינו, לתפארת אבותינו ומחנכינו. ויתרומם ויתנשא קרן ישראל וקרן התורה הקדושה למעלה מעלה, ויזכנו לישב באהלה של תורה, ולראות אחינו בית ישראל עוסקים בתורה ובמצות ובנחמת ציון וירושלים בב״א.

האם הי' לנו רשות מכל חללינו וקדושינו לעשות כזאת? הרי כתוב בתורה —
לא תשכח!

רבנו דוד הלוי האריך ימים יותר משמונים שנה ונפטר ביום כ"ז בשבט, בשנת תכ"ז ונקבר בעיר לבוב.

רבי יוסף שאול נתנזון, רבה של לבוב מספר שבימיו כמאתיים שנה אמרי פטירתו של רבנו הט"ז, נפתח על פי מקרה קברו, ומצאוהו שלם בגופו והדור בלבושו, שלא שלטה בו רימה, ותולעת לא היתה בו.

על מצבתו חרות: "ביום כ"ו שבט, שנת תכ"ז לפ"ק נטמן הגאון הגדול מאור הגולה, הרב בעל הטו"ז מורינו ורבניו מו"ה דוד בן מו"ה שמואל הלוי. מחבר חיבורים יקרים, באור תורתו האיר לדור דורים, על כל שלחן ערוך וארבעה טורים. הן בעודנו בחיים כבר זכה כי נפסקה כמותו הלכה, הוראתו שלמה זכה וערוכה. — ת' נ' צ' ב' ה'.

"וה א־לי ואנוהו"

"זה א־לי ואנוהו אלקי אבי וארומנהו", על זה המדרש אומר: "ראתה שפחה על הים מה שלא ראה יחזקאל בנבואתו". ודבר תמוה הוא. למה נאחז המדרש דוקא ביחקזאל מכל הנביאים, הלא כל הנביאים ראו מה שראה יחזקאל?, הסבר לכך ניתן למצוא בגמרא בחגיגה (דף י"ג ע"ב): "למה יחזקאל דומה, לבן כפר שראה את המלך. ולמה ישעי דומה, לבן כרך שראה את המלך". הבחנת בין נביאות יחזקאל לנביאות ישעי נוכל להשיג מהמעשה באלי הנביא בשעה שנפרד מאלישע. ככתוב (מלכים ב' פרק ב' פסוק ט') "שאל מה אעשה לך בטרם אלקח מעמך" אמר אלי לאלישע. שעליו ענה אלישע: "ויהי נא פי שנים ברוחך אלי". אמר לו אלי: "הקשית לשאול, אם תראה אותי לקח מאתך יהי לך כן ואם אין לא יהי־ה". אחר כך כשבאו הרכב והסוסים של אש מן השמים ונטלו את אלי', צעק אלישע: "אבי אבי רכב ישראל ופרשיו".

באמת צריכים אנו להבין הפסוקים, מהו הסימן שנתן אלי' לאלישע, וכי רק בשביל שראה אותו נלקח ממנו ראוי הוא שתשרה עליו שכינת ה'? האמנם העלה זה אותו למדרגה כל כך גבוה שיזכה לדבר גדול כוה? ויש לפרשו, דהנה לפי דרך העולם אם איש פשוט יבוא לעיר גדולה ויביט על כל בניני' הגדולים וכל מלאכתי־ה המסובכות מאוד, שלא ראה כמותם כל חייו, לא ירגיש כלל מה פעולתם של דברים אלו ולמה הם משמשים, אלא יתפעל מגודל העיר בכלל, בלי שים לב לדברים העיקריים של מעשי העיר. אבל איש מלומד ונבון שיודע מהו הדבר האמיתי שצריך האדם להתפעל ממנו, יכיר העיקר של העיר ולא יגרר אחרי חיצוניותה.

ובזה נוכל להבין הנסיון שהתנסה בו אלישע. שבדרך העולם אם איש מההמון יראה מעשה נפלא כזה, שסוסים ורכב של אש יורדים מן השמים יעמוד בהתפעלות וילטש עיניו על הדבר הנורא שלא ראה ולא יראה כמותו כל ימיו. האם ירגיש אפילו לרגע אחד למה בא דבר זה ומה יעשה? אבל אלישע, אף על פי שגם הוא עדיין לא ראה דבר כזה כל חייו, לא נתן לב למראה הנפלא שראו עיניו, אלא מיד הרגיש מה תכלית הסוסים והרכב שבאו ליטול את רבו הגדול אלי׳ הנביא. מיד הרגיש האבידה הגדולה וצעק: "אבי אבי, רכב ישראל ופרשיו". זה הי׳ הנסיון שעל ידו אלי׳ הנביא שתלמידו אלישע הי׳ ראוי לקבל עליו השראת השכינה שעל ידו אלי׳ הנביא שתלמידו אלישל הלי׳: "אם תראה אותי לקח מאתך"... אם מתוך כל הנסים הנפלאים שיבאו תוכל להוציא העיקר ותרגיש שאנכי נלקח מאתך שלמענו באו כל הנסים, ולא תחשוב שהם עיקר לעצמם, אלא יש בתוכם דבר שהוא

העיקר ודבר זה תוכל להוציא, אז "יהי לך כן", שאז ראוי אתה שתשרה עליך פי שנים מנבואתי. אבל "ואם אין" שלא תוכל לירד לעומקו של הדברים ותשאר כאחד מבני ההמון המתפעלים מדבר שהוא רק הלבוש שבה מתלבש העיקר. אז "לא יהי' לך", סימן הוא שאתה כשאר בני אדם ואין אתה ראוי להשראת השכינה. והפסוק מספר לנו שאלישע לא נטה אחר החיצוניות, אלא מיד צעק: "אבי אבי הרכב ישראל ופרשיו", מיד הכיר הפנים וידע שזהו העיקר של הנס. ועל ידי זה זכה לפי שנים בנבואות אלי.

זאת הוא גם ההבחנה בין נבואת ישעי' לנבואת יחזקאל. בנבואת ישעי. אנו רואים שאף על פי שראה מעשים נפלאים במראה נבואתו לא התפעל מהם כלל, אלא ממראה ה' יתברך עצמו. כמו שאמר הפסוק (ישעי' ו' פסוק ה'): "אוי לי כי נדמתי וגו' כי את המלך ה' צב־אות ראו עיני". אבל בנבואת יחזקאל אנו רואים, שספר כל המראות שראה ולא הבדיל בין עיקר המראה לטפל. וזה מה שאמרה הגמרא בחגיגה "למה יחזקאל דומה לאיש כפר שראה את המלך". כי דרך איש כפר כשרואה את המלך מספר לחבריו כל מה שראה אצל המלך, דהיינו הסוסים הבאים לפניו. הקרון שישב בו, כל משמשיו, עבדיו וכו', שדברים אלו הם רק המפל למלך עצמו. וזה הי' כביכול מדרגת נבואת יחזקאל, כאיש כפר המספר כל מה שראה אבל איש כרך לא נותן לב לדברים אלו, רק מספר עיקר ראייתו, דהיינו שראה את המלך ודבריו עמו ואין מתפעל כלל מטפל הסובב אותו. ובדרך זו היתה נבואת ישעי', שהוציא העיקר מנבואתו ולא נתן לב לטפל שבו התלבשה הנבואה.

בזה מוסבר לנו המדרש של השירה. דהנה בקריעת ים סוף ראו כל עם ישראל את מעשה ה' ונפלאותיו, והי' להם להשתומם על הנסים הגלוים שראו, על ש"סוס ורוכבו רמה בים" והם ניצלו וכל שאר הנפלאות שראו שם. ומכל מקום אמרו לנו חז"ל שעיקר השירה הוא בפסוק "זה א"לי אנוהו". העיקר מה שהוציאו מכל הנפלאות הגדולות שראו. הוא הכרת הגדולת של רבונו של עולם, שזאת היתה תכלית כל הנסים האלו שעשה ה' יתברך, שידעו ישראל ויכירו שיש השגחה למעלה מהם ואין העולם נוהג על ידי מקרה בעלמא. בני ישראל על הים היו מדרגה של רואי העיקר מתוך הטפל. ובצדק דרשו חז"ל: "ראתה שפחה על הים מה שלא ראה יחזקאל בנבואתו". ובזה עלו בני ישראל על הים למדרגה שלא הגיע אלי' אפילו יחזקאל בנבואתו".

בעונותינו הרבים התרחקה האנושית בימינו אנו ממדרגה נשגבה זו. בני אדם הולכים בדרך ההבל של העולם הזה, חושבים שהעיקר בעולם הוא הכסף, הכבוד וכל שאר דברי התאוה החמריים שפתה אותם יצר הרע ללכת אחריהם. דברי הבל אלה מסנורות את עיניהם כל כך, עד כי ניצוץ האמונה שבהם בבורא העולם הולך ודועך, ויש מהם שמתכחשים לגמרי לאדון העולם ובועטים בעיקר ואומרים שכל העולם כולו נעשה במקרה בעלמא. דבר שהמוח לא הי' יכול להשיג בעצמו בלי התערבות יצר הרע. ואפילו אותם שלא הוטעו כל כך על ידי יצרם בעצמו בלי התערבות יצר הרע. ואפילו אותם שלא הוטעו כל כך על ידי הצרם הרע ועדיין אומרים שמאמינים בבורא העולם, אינם מקבלים ואינם מכירים בתורה הקדושה שהיא עיקר בריאת עולם ואשר בשבילה נברא העולם. כמו שאמרו חז"ל (בראשית רבה, הובא ברש"י בתחלת בראשית). "לא נברא העולם אלא בשביל התורה שנקראת ראשית דרכו". יש מהם שאין יודעים אפילו שיש תורה בעולם ומה היא התורה.

בעזרת ה' יתברך אנו בישיבה יודעים באמת מעלת התורה הקדושה. זוכים אנו ללומדה כמה וכמה שעות ביום ובלילה, בלי עול עולם הזה על ערפינו. מכירים אנו שזהו העיקר שבשבילה נברא העולם הזה. ברוך ה' עדיין צעירים אנחנו, ויש כמה שנים לפנינו שנזכה לעסוק בהן בדברי אלקים חיים, שהינה התורה הקדושה. נוכל להעלות מדרגתינו בקדושת התורה עד שנזכה לחדוש קול הנבואה בקרבינו ולביאת המשיח במהרה בימינו, אמן.

רבי דוד ב״ר שמואל הלוי בעל ה"מורי זהב״

רבי דוד נולד בשנת שמ"ו (1586) בלודמיר שבגליל וואָהלין לאביו רבי שמואל הלוי, שהיה אף הוא גדול בתורה ומראשי העיר. וחתנו של הגאון רבי יצחק בצלאל'ס מגדולי פוסקי עמנו וחברו של הגאון רבי שלום שכנא. רבו של הרמ"א. רבי דוד מביא מפעם לפעם בשם זקנו כמה פסקים בפירושיו ל"שלחן ערוד".

עוד בילדותו הפליא דוד את מוריו בשכלו החריף ועומק בינתו, כשהיה כבן שבע, היה כבר בקי בשלוש הבבות (בבא קמא, בבא מציעא ובבא בתרא), כן נודע כשקדן עצום ועד מהרה נתפרסם כעילוי בקי וחריף.

אחיו הגדול רבי יצחק הלוי בעל שו״ת "מהר״י הלוי״ הוליכו בנעוריו בין שבילי התורה והכניסו לעולם ההוראה וממנו ספג רבי דוד את ראשית דרכו בתורה, ורבי דוד החשיב את אחיו כרבו המובהק, וידידות ואחוה אמתית היתה ביניהם כל הימים. גם אחרי שנשא את בתו של הב״ח לאשה ושמו יצא לתהילה כגאון גדול, הציע את כל שאלותיו וספיקותיו לפני אחיו לפתרן, כתלמיד לפני רבו.

הוא היה רגיל לחתום בסוף מכתביו לאחיו: "דוד הוא הקטן בן לאדוני אבי, מזרנו ורבנו הרב שמואל". ואחיו, רבי יצחק, השיב לו בתשובותיו: "דוד הוא הקטן בעיניו, וגדול הוא בכל עניניו, חסיד ועניו הלוא הוא אדוני אחי חביבי, ידידי רדידי, צמידי חמידי, אב בחכמה ורך בשנים, האלוף הנעלה, לשם ולתהילה קנקן מלא בעיון ופלפולא, כבוד מורנו הרב דוד שיחיה... (שו"ת מהר"י הלוי מ"ט, נ).

כשעבר רבי יצחק לכהן כרב ואב־בית־דין בעיר חעלם, לא נלוה תלמידו, אחיו אליו אלא הלך ללמוד בישיבה הגדולה המפורסמת של רבי יואל סירקים, המכונה הב״ח, בעיר מזיבוז, בישיבת הב״ח למדו אז בחורים שכבר מלאו את כריסם בש״ס ופוסקים, ובאו לישיבת הב״ח ללמוד הוראת איסור והיתר וארבעת חלקי הטור.

כשראה הב״ח את דוד, שהיה אז רק כן שתים עשרה, נער צנום ורזה מעמלה של תרוה סירב לקבלו, באמרו: "עדיין אתה צעיר מכדי ללמוד בישיבתי״. אולם הנער לא נפל ברוחו וענה: ישמע קודם, כבוד הרב את דברי התלמיד, ואחר־כך יוציא משפט.

אופן דיבורו ובטחונו העצמי של הנער, שבו את לב הב״ח, והוא הסכים לשמוע מפיו חדוש בתורה. כמעט התחיל להגיד את חידושו, נוכח הב״ח שלפניו עומד עלוי שגדולות נכונו לו. שעה אתוכה התפלפל עמו והתפעל משכלו המחודד ועוצם הבנתו. לבסוף חיבק אותו הב״ח, נשק אותו על מצחו ואמר עליך נאמר: "עוקר הרים וטוחנן"... אתה נשאר כאן, וכל מחסורך עלי.

בישיבת הב״ח מצא לו חברים גדולי התורה, שעמם יכול היה להשתשע בפלפולא דאורייתא. הודות לשקידתו הגדולה ובהתמדתו העצומה ומשכלו החד, נעשה במהרה לארי שבחבורה, הגאון הב״ח שמר עליו כעל בבת עיניו, וכשעבר לכהן ברבנות בבריסק, לקח אתו גם את תלמידיו החריף, שהיה מבחירי התלמידים בישיבתו.

לב״ח היתה בת ושמה רבקה. היא היתה יפת תואר ומלומדת ובקיאה בתנ״ך. עליה מספרים, שפעם דן הב״ח עם תלמידו רבי דוד ברמב״ם הלכות ספר תורה פרק ז׳ הלכה וז המרמז שיש בתורה מלים של עשר, אחת עשרה אותיות. שאל רבי דוד: היכן נמצאת בתורה מלה ארוכה בת עשר אותיות? הרי הארוכות ביותר הן: למשפחותיהם״, "לישמעאלים״, והן רק בנות תשע אותיות?

אמר הב״ח נקרא לנערה רבקה ונשאלה את פיה! הנערה ענתה מיד: ביהושע

פרק י״ח פסוק כ״א כתוב "למשפחותיהם" מלא וכך אפוא עשרת אותיות. ובמגילת אסתר: "והאחשדרפנים", אחת עשרה אותיות...

הגאון הב״ח לקחו לחתן לבתו, ובעיר בריסק נערכה חגיגת הנישואין של רבי דוד עם בת רבו **רבקה.**

אחרי התונתו נפרד רבי דוד מבית חותנו וקבע ישיבתו בעיר קראקא, בהיותו שם מתו עליו שני בניו הקטנים, והצדיק עליו את הדין על שקבע את דירתו למעלה מבית הכנסת (אורח חיים קנ"א).

בשנת שע״ח בערך נתקבל לרב ואב״ד בק״ק פוטיליצ׳ה בגליציה. עיירה זו היתה קטנה ולא יכלה לפרנס אותו, אך הוא קיבל עליו את הדבר באהבה גמורה כדרכם של גדולי ישראל. אשר הסתפקו במועט במה שיש להם מבוראם. כעבור זמן קצר נתקבל רבי דוד לרב בעיר פוזנא אשר בפולין גדול, ושם כיהן ברבנות כטשרים שנה.

רבי דוד עמד כל הזמן בקשר מכתבים עם חותנו הגאון והריץ אליו את כל שאלותיו בהלכה, הב״ח החשיב מאוד את דעת חתנו, והסכים עמו תמיד להלכה ולמעשה, ופעם ביקש ממנו הסכמה לפסק דינו, להתיר אשה מקשרי עגוניה. בתשובה אחת כותב עליו הב״ח "עוקר הרים וטוחנן זו בזו בפלפולו, בהיכלו אומר בבוד כולו, קדש יאמר לו, הוא חתני ר״מ ואב״ד האלוף דוד סג״ל, נרו ונר זרעו יאיר עד ביאת הגואל״. רבי יהושע פלק בעל "פני יהושע״ כותב עליו, הלכה כמותו ברוב המקומות ולאורו אנו הולכים, שהוא גדול שבאחרונים שאין למעלה ממנו״.

בשנת ת"א בערך, אחר פטירת הגאון הב"ח חזר רבי דוד לארץ מולדתו, ונתקבל לאב"ד ור"מ בעיר אוסטרוה, שהיתה אז מקום תורה חשוב ביותר עיר ואם בישראל, מלאה חכמים וסופרים. וכהונת רבנות מפוארת, מאז שימש בה המהרש"א עשר שנים לפני כן, רבי דוד יסד שם ישיבה גדולה שאלי' נהרו תלמידים רבים מכל קצוי הארץ. רבי דוד עצמו התבטא כך: "אשר נקבצו אלי תלמידים חשובים קרובים ורחוקים מקצוי הארץ, מעולם לא ראיתי קיבוץ ישיבה חשובה כמוה". רבי דוד ישב שם בשקט ובשלוה, והמשיך לכתוב את ספרו הכביר "טורי זהב" על ארבעת חלקי השלחו־ערוד.


בשנת תי״ד נבחר לרב בעיר לבוב. שם מתה עליו אשתו הראשונה, בתו של הב״ח, ולקח לאשה אלמנתו של גיסו רבי שמואל צבי הירץ, בנו של הב״ח ורבה של פינצוב. שני בניו מאשתו הראשונה, שהיו גדולי התורה והחכמה. רבי מרדכי ורבי שלמה. מתו מיתת קדושים ביום ח׳ באייר תכ״ד בלמברג, בנו השלישי היה הגאוז רבי ישעיהו סג״ל רב בקומורה.

בין גדולי תלמידיו נמנו, הגאון רבי שמואל בבמברג, מחבר ספר "נחלת שבעה"; הרב רבי ישראל, רב בלודמיר גאון גדול בעל השפעה, מראשי ועד ארבע ארצות, ויוזם תרגום התנ"ך לגרמנית.

כאמור חיבר רבי דוד את ספרו ט"ורי זהב" על כל ארבעת חלקי הטור והשלחן-ערוך. בחיבורו הוא מביא ליד כל הלכה בשלחן-ערוך את מקור ההלכה, את דעות לפוסקים האחרונים, בודק כל סתירה בין הפוסקים לדברי השלחן-ערוך, מברר ומלבן את ההלכה על בוריה, ומכריע, בדרך כלל הוא מסיק כדברי השלחן ערוך והרמ"א, הוא מחשיב מאוד את דעת המהרש"ל ודעת חותנו הב"ח, אולם אינו נמנע מלחלוק עליו כשדבריו אינם נראים לו.

רבי דוד חיבר עוד ספרים שהם כמילואים לחיברויו על השו"ע ובשטחים שמחוץ להלכה "זהב מזוקק", "הגהות ותיקונים לטו"ז", "דברי דוד" פירוש על רש"י על התורה. "תשובות דוד" כולל תשובות בהלכה שהחליף עם גדולי התורה.

רבנו דוד זכה לשם טוב בכל העולם, הוא נקרא פעמים רבות להשתתף בועד ארבע ארצות, וכל ערי המדינה היו סרות למשמעתו, הוא גם זכה לעושר רב לבנים ובני בנים גדולי התורה ותופשי ישיבות, ידידים ומעריצים רבים.

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
